#### Sustainability Statement

Sustainability refers to the avoidance of the depletion of natural resources to maintain an ecological balance. The word itself provenances from 'sustainable'+ ity; meaning, able to sustain, give support to, to hold up (sustain+ able). (You Matter, 2020) Thinking about sustainability we must consider the 3 P's, being People, Planet and Profit, being necessary to produce a balance between those. (Thread Channel, 2016).



ashion is one of the least sustainable industries (2nd one after the Oil production industry). One of the biggest effects against the planet in the fashion industry was the revolutionary concept of fast fashion. As well as seen with the concept of fast food, anything fast cuts corners to make gain market and production advantages.

Some of the important effects of fashion against the environment are that it is affecting the soil (fertilizer and pesticide), water (dying process- 2nd grater polluter of local freshwater in the world); moreover, in many cases still encourages the kill of animals for animalbased fabrics; and the synthetic fabrics, are not biodegradable, thus endangering, even more, our planet. At the same time, the industry maintains the existence of low-payed workers whose working place is usually unsafe. There must be mentioned the CO2 consumption due to production and transport as well (responsible for 10% of the carbon consumption in the world).


Even more, the discard of clothing is increasing landfill waste. There is no doubt that fashion is a very damaging industry for the planet. Nowadays, because of environmental and social problems, as well as the fact that people are more aware of the issues, the concept of sustainability started to reflect, more specifically, improvements in areas like natural resources overexploitation, manufacturing operations, business, and laws changes. As far as an action is causing less or no harm to the environment and ecosystem, its operating is considered to be sustainable. (You Matter, 2020)

Palimpsest is referring to the combination of the social classes, creating something new. Regarding this, I used elements of royalty (e.g. brocade fabric, architectural elements of Peleş castle) with the ones of the working class (e.g. use of boiler suit and the charcoal color, etc.). The title itself is metaphorically used in its definition, the collection having as scope the creation of something new, in which the incipient structures are still visible.

Regarding the worrying statistics, we should rethink our sustainable practice in our day-to-day life, as well as our decisions as designers. Among the measures we can take is to stop encouraging this "fast fashion", the repair of clothes instead of throwing them, to use non-plastic based fabrics and to do some research before buying something to wear.



#### Let's talk about fur

ur is 'the skin of an animal with the fur still on it, used especially for making clothes.' (Oxford learner's dictionary. 2020). It is one of the oldest forms of clothing with lots of traditions and meanings along the history. Indeed, in past years there started to be more of a concern due its morality, building up a conflict of opinion. What is the conflict about and is it alright to wear fur?

Fur had different meaning for humans throughout time. Aboriginal people believe they partake of animal power, by wearing their fur and as a 'gift' through which they show respect to the animal, so that humans survive.

Fur also conveyed status in society, as in the Golden Ages it represented luxury. Nowadays as some proclaim that fur is a crime against nature, others attest that wearing and admiring fur should remind modern society our dependency on nature for our survival. (Herscovici. 2014)



As even Peter Singer, in his book Animal Liberation, attests that it's hypocritical to protest the fur trade while most people eat meat daily; more animals are killed in North America daily for food than are used for fur in a year. (cited in Herscovici. 2014) Only 8% of the population identifies themselves as vegan, vegetarian or something between, out of them only 3% are fully vegan. (Williams. 2020) The difference between vegetarianism and wearing fur regarding morality would be who is wearing fur-mostly being upper class people, as the fur apparel is expensive, making it easier to be considered an 'unnecessary luxury'. (Herscovici. 2014) Most activists are part of the working class, therefor we can understand that the fight against fur might be as well a fight against the social class.

Moreover, there is the problem regarding which animals are being killed. Fur in high society usually refers to luxurious or rare animals. In 1960's the most popular kinds of fur were silver mink, stripped fox and red fox, cheaper alternatives being pelts of wolf, Persian lamb or muskrat. (Wikipedia.2020) In past years more countries banned the killing of animals for fur and in 2018 BFC banned the use of real fur in Fashion Week London. (Pitcher.2019)





There are alternatives for real animal fur called faux fur, which is usually made from synthetic materials. The main problem about this is that 35% of the oceanic primary microplastic pollution is produced by fashion industry (Rissanen and Gwilt. 2020) and 100,000 marine animals die as a result of plastic ingestion.

By 2050, the ocean is expected to contain more plastic than fish. (Lonely Whale cited in Pitcher. 2019) Regarding this, it can be observed that even the alternatives for a much more moral option, are not sustainable and it destroys animal habitats.

In conclusion, neither fur or faux fur is 'good' or fully sustainable for the environment. The controversy depends strictly on the points of view as both options are making a negative impact on nature as presented above. A preferable option for the sake of environment would be to do an in-depth research on the materials that the clothes we wear or make are made out of, trying to be as sustainable as possible through our practice while leaving a smaller footprint to the nature.





I chose the title 'Segreti di Seta'' (Secrets made of Silk) because it perfectly conveys the main aspects of my collection. I tried to explain through my collection a mood full of mystery, femininity, romance and elegance. I chose for the title an italic, romantic font, behind it being a sketch of a Gothic church, keeping the correlation between the title and the research very obvious.

For the shapes that I used in my colection I took elements and inspiration from Gothic Architecture, Renaissance clothing and organic shapes from the shells that I collected in Dubai. More elements are influenced by different designers that aproached same concepts. Some examples are Alberta Ferretti, Valentino Garavani, Alexander McQueen and House of Chanel who reinvented Renaissance clothing. Except the practitioners mentioned above, other personalities that inspired my collection are: Peggy Guggenheim- regarded mostly my muse, gallerist and femme fatale; House of Dior, Chloé, Madeleine Vionnet- regarding their use of drape and volatile fabric; Mariano Fortuny- with his invetions, shapes and the use of drape and Paul Poiretmostly with his use of oriental influence in European fashion.

All the fabrics that I chose are in tones of yellow and ochre, matching my colour board, with contrasting black and touches of gold. I am trying to be sustainable through my practice, most of my fabrics (except the braid, lace and embroidery) being natural. Also, as Venice is well known for its silk production, most of my fabrics are made of natural silk. Silk is one of the most luxurious types of fabric used in the fashion industry. Silk is a natural material, a protein fibre produced by silkworms. As silk is a natural fibre it will easily biodegrade in the soil when discarded after the end of its useful life and will not pollute the environment like other petroleum-based fabrics such as acrylic or nylon.
